Capacity Buildings:

In this year under the 'Father Care' programme different types of exposure and trainings have been organized at national, state, district and community levels on different issues with different stakeholders. The details of this capacity building programme are as follows -

1. Participation in regional symposium at region level:

FEM and CHSJ had organized the regional level symposiums in different states. Network members of four states that were a part of the father Care programme have also participated and contributed in the symposium. The Western India regional Symposium on "Men and Boys for Gender Justice" was held on the 12th & 13th September 14 in Pune. The East India regional symposium was held on the 19th & 20th September 14 in Kolkata and on 22nd-23rd September, 2014 North Indian regional symposium was held These regional Symposiums have a contribution towards the Global Symposium which has held from 10th-13th November, 2014 New Delhi. As part the Regional Symposium representatives of CSOs working with Men and Boys for Gender justice, representatives from the feminist groups, academicians, representatives of funding agencies, advocates, student union leaders, trade union, media activist, CBOs and other individuals were present.

Members of state networks from MP, UP, Jharkhand and Maharastra have participated in these regional symposiums and shared their states experiences during the different sessions as –

- Custodial violence, military torture, violence by police, violence in riots; its impact on men and boys Working with Men and Boys on Gender Justice: Approaches and Strategies
- Pressure of masculinity and patriarchy; how men/boys engage in violence on themselves
- Globalization, media and construction of masculinity
- Men committing sexual violence against men/boys and issues of sexual orientation/identities and dignity
- Modern media; advertisements, serials, films
- Traditional media, folk songs
- Home, Family and community
- Institutions, schools, colleges, work places etc
- Experiences from MASVAW, MAE and Fathers Care Campaign and Join my village intervention

It was a great opportunity for the members of state networks as lot of new ideas and issues came up during the symposium. Also they have learned a lot. The cultural team of state network members also presented their views on different issues of the states through cultural performances. It was also a great experience as many of the network members met with people from different states and got more clarity on the issues. Details of regional symposium are -

2. Participation in the 2nd MenEngage Global Symposium:

3. Exposure visit to Pune (Maharastra)-

A three days' exposure visit to CHSJ partner's field in Pune (MH) had been held from 19-21 December 2014. This visit included interaction with community level volunteers (Animators), Facilitators and interaction with group members through field visits in one of the villages Rajapur of Nari Samata Manch. The purpose was to know about the group processes at community level and to know from Animators and Facilitators about their experiences of working with men and boys for gender equality.

On the second day, all members participated in an annual adhiveshan of Samajhdar-Jodidar (Enhancing Male Participation for Gender Equality in Maharashtra) project at Gandhi Bhawan, Pune (MH). Objectives of the adhiveshan were to learn and share from each other and create energy among Animators and group members to sustain the project values, achievements in future. 72 Animators and 189 active group members participated in adhiveshan. 4. Training of trainers (TOT):

CHSJ has organized the two days residential training of trainers in three states with members of state networks. All the participants of these training are associated with the process of community level training on different issues especially gender, gender based violence and child right. Facilitators have used the principle of participatory learning approaches and different types of activities as group work and presentation, collective discussion, educational games, experience sharing in small groups, session facilitation etc were conducted. The main objective of the training was -

- To build the understanding on the issues of child right & caring.
- To build the skills of training on the issue of father caring through participatory methodology.

The main topics that were covered were as—differentiating between "needs and wants" of a child, understanding child abuse, children's rights in a village family setting, meaning of caring, caring and men, different aspect of men's caring, caring and socialization etc. In the second day the participants made their plan of follow up at the community level.

Reactions of media during the workshops-

- If there has to be gender justice at home and in the family, then first men have to change their perception about women that women are humans and not just puppets who have to do domestic chores.
- If men get involved in the care of their children, then the children will also develop an emotional closeness to their father.
- The intervention by MAE is commendable, through this, the men will be sensitized towards women and children and build closer bonds with them.
- If men understand their role in domestic chores and in the care of children, then the burden of responsibility on women will be less.
